Research Question

 How do leaders perceive and practice creation care in congregations and in everyday life, and what is the missional character of their perceptions and practices?

Theoretical: Sustainability

- A non-religious description of caring for creation that views the earth as an interdependent system of geological and biological processes on which human society depends and that takes action to ensure the welfare of those processes so that human society can exist indefinitely within them.
- The Natural Step, framework for sustainable conceptualizing and decision-making used worldwide by organizations, businesses, cities.

Theoretical: Globalization

- An emerging phenomenon of social, economic, political, and cultural interrelatedness worldwide.
 Our resource consumption, actions and inactions, systems of infrastructure, worldviews, and communication not only impact human society and the environment locally but also have global connections and implications.

Theoretical: Global Civil Society

- The public participation of people through nonprofit and non-governmental organizations toward the development of better living conditions throughout the world.
- "...the sphere of ideas, values, institutions, organizations, networks, and individuals located between the family, the state, and the market and operating beyond the confines of national societies, polities, and economies."*

Biblical: Nature as Active Subject

- All creation worships God, shares in God's first covenant, receives God's care and redemption
- Corrective to the commodification of nature and to anthropocentrism
- Nature has value beyond its usefulness to human beings
- Recovering the idea of viewing the rest of nature as a thou rather than an it

Biblical: (Earth) Stewardship

- A comprehensive view of stewardship in which humanity participates in the work of Christ, the preeminent steward, assuming responsibility for all that has been entrusted to him and voluntarily limiting himself for the life of the world.

Theological: Perichoresis

- The theological concept of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit as a Trinitarian community of co-equal, interdependent persons finding unity in their dynamic interactions of self-giving love for other.
- Indwelling becomes basis for reimagining the missional church's reciprocal relationships with members of its community and with all creation.

Theological: Eschatology

- A biblical/ theological concept of the end times, includes themes of judgment, the consummation of history, and the redemption of all creation.

Theological: Sacramental Imagination

- Christ's presence in, with, and under the elements.
- Luther says Christ's presence in the Eucharist testifies to God's presence in the whole creation
 - "God is substantially present everywhere, in and through all creatures, in all their parts and places, so that the world is full of God and He fills all, but without His being encompassed and surrounded by it." Luther, WA 23:134

Segue into Practical Ministry

- "What suffice are not good ideas, critical though they be, but good communities; in our case anticipatory communities meeting adaptive challenges. Anticipatory communities are home places where it is possible to reimagine worlds and reorder possibilities, places where new or renewed practices give focus to an ecological and postindustrial way of life." – Rasmussen (2013)

- A congregation is an ideal setting for modeling the kind of creation care needed for a more sustainable world.

Methodology: Explanatory Sequential Mixed Methods

- First collecting quantitative data (survey) and then explaining the quantitative results further through qualitative data (interviews).
- Conducted a census survey by administering a questionnaire to all pastors rostered in synod
- Pastors serving congregations asked to choose three lay members to complete the questionnaire, if possible
 - (1) a congregational president/ elected leader
 - (2) congregation's creation care team member
 - (3) someone between the ages of 18 and 29
- Sampling: non-probability purposive snowball type

Methodology: Explanatory Sequential Mixed Methods

- Quantitative 136 participants
 - 63.2% clergy, 36.8% lay (43.4% of rostered leaders)
 - 56.9% male, 43.1% female; average age 56
 - 82.1% Democrat or Democratic-leaning; 14.7%
 Republican or Republican-leaning
 - Represented 84 congregations (61.3% in the synod)
- Qualitative 4 congregations, 13 interviewees
 - Selected 2 congregations that had active creation care teams and 2 that did not
 - Transcribed and coded recorded interviews



Conclusions

- (1) Leaders in the synod are concerned about several challenges facing the earth.
- (2) The Synod exhibits awareness of and openness to biblical and theological connections to earth stewardship.
- (3) Political preference is a major factor relative to creation care perceptions.
- (4) Congregational creation care practices are less pronounced than personal practices.
- (5) Integrating congregations demonstrate greater capacity to exhibit the missional character of creation care than do those without creation care teams.
